INITIATIVES OF CHANGE INTERNATIONAL

Initiatives of Change International is a non-profit organization registered in Switzerland, serving the wider lofC movement. Thirty-six national bodies and programmes comprise its formal membership. Each member operates autonomously with a focus on addressing specific local needs.

What is Initiatives of Change?

Initiatives of Change (lofC) is a worldwide movement of people, who are committed to the transformation of society and to building trust across the world's divides.

lofC International has special consultative status with the Economic and Social Council of the UN (ECOSOC and IOM) and participatory status at the Council of Europe as well as a seat at the International Organization for Migration. lofC International is governed by an International Council of up to 11 members who contribute their time and experience voluntarily. Day-to-day management is carried out by an Executive Director who oversees the operations team.

What Drives Us Forward

The Vision: a just, peaceful and sustainable world to which everyone, responding to the call of conscience, makes their unique contribution.

The Mission: to inspire, equip and connect people to address world needs, starting with themselves. We work worldwide on many initiatives through a network of individuals, groups and organizations.

Our Areas of Focus

Trustbuilding: Peace and social cohesion through trust and reconciliation.

Ethical Leadership: Developing a leadership culture based on moral integrity, compassion and selfless service.

Sustainable Living: Economic justice and environmental sustainability through transformation of motives and behaviour.

A Brief History

Initiatives of Change grew out of the work of Frank Buchman (1878-1961), an American Christian minister of the Lutheran denomination.

Buchman believed there is a divine purpose for the world and everyone in it, and sought to demonstrate the connection between faith and change in society. In the period between the two World Wars, as European nations began to re-arm for war, Buchman called for 'moral and spiritual re-armament' as the way to build 'a hate-free, fear-free, greed-free world'. Following World War II, Moral Re-Armament (MRA), as it became known, promoted trustbuilding and reconciliation among former enemies, based on changes in individual motivation and character.

Over the years his work expanded to include people of different religions and none. In 2001 it changed its name to Initiatives of Change.

International Council

The International Council is an elected board that provides leadership to IofC in line with the goals of Initiatives of Change International and the decisions of the annual Global Assembly.

PROGRAMMES

Initiatives of Change formally recognizes certain programmes as members of our network. We partner with these programmes to provide visibility and support for their global reach.

Creators of Peace (CoP)

Tanzania's first Creators of Peace Circle took place at Dar es Salaam University College of Education at the end of August 2018.

Seventeen women, aged 24-25, took part. 'I have learnt that forgiveness starts with my own acceptance of wrongs done, and it should always begin with me,' said one participant. During the year, Creators of Peace Circles took place in more than 20 countries, including Colombia, Mali, Syria, Nepal, Switzerland and New Zealand.

Initiatives for Land, Lives and Peace (ILLP)

The ILLP team was invited to hold side events at the UN climate summit in Katowice, Poland, in December 2018. The first, held jointly with the African Development Bank, focused on trustbuilding in the context of land restoration and climate resilience. The next, held with the Global Environment Facility, dealt with ecological literacy. Both side events were well attended and received a good response.

Foundations for Freedom (F4F)

'Participatory budgeting' enables citizens to choose priorities for public spending in their communities. This is now being implemented in more than 140 Ukrainian towns and cities, thanks largely to the impetus from F4F, the Initiatives of Change network in Ukraine. Under this programme, a town or city council invites its citizens to propose how a part of their budget should be used. After a vote, the most popular projects are implemented. 'This can help understanding and trust to grow in Ukrainian communities,' says Kostiantyn Ploskyi, chair of F4F.

Farmers Dialogue International (FDI)

In October 2018, Korean farmers and FDI organized a dialogue on 'The role of family farming for sustainable biotic communities'. It demonstrated the significant role of cooperatives in Korean farming and their strong relationships with consumers. Delegates attended from DR Congo, Kenya, Burkina Faso, Sri Lanka, Cambodia and France.

PEOPLE ARE OUR PURPOSE

Initiatives of Change is active in over 60 countries. One of its strengths is its capacity to generate grassroots initiatives by committed individuals. We celebrate how our teams address our three areas of focus. Here is a snapshot of some of their activities.

Australia

On the basis that everyone's story matters, the residents of the Sydney suburb of Blacktown – 366,000 people from 188 nationalities – were invited to join in a forum on 'Australians sharing a new story' in April 2019. Some 250 people participated in various events through the weekend. Through hearing each others' stories of struggle and achievement, they aimed to 'find a new story of our shared humanity'. Speakers included a Chief Inspector of Police, a former child soldier from South Sudan and an Imam who had flown to New Zealand to assist at the funerals of the 51 killed in Christchurch.

France

'Pari(s) à 2' promotes meeting and dialogue between French people and migrants through convivial outings in pairs in Paris to combat loneliness and put an end to prejudice. People are paired up on the basis of common areas of interest. They meet for half a day every two weeks, over about three months. Such activities as walks, opera or a simple coffee are all opportunities to understand French culture while learning from each other.

Caux Scholars Program

Twenty-three Caux Scholars took part in the four-week Caux Scholars Program in June and July 2018. They also participated in the Caux Forum on Towards an Inclusive Peace, which focused on addressing violent extremism and on restorative justice. Scholars joined community groups of Forum participants, both as contributors and co-facilitators. After the programme, scholars were encouraged to apply what they had learned in their home countries. Some thousand people from 54 countries have taken part in the Caux Scholars Program in the last 27 years.

Egypt

Throughout 2018, the Egyptian Moral Rearmament Association (EMRA) team met each month to discuss their role in promoting moral values and national unity. A special concern was to reinforce relations between Muslim and Christian citizens. EMRA's annual Ramadan Iftar at the Agricultural Club in Dokki was followed by sharing among Christian and Muslim attendees. EMRA condemned the attacks on Christians in Minya, and members met with Coptic bishops.



United Kingdom

On World Refugee Day, 100 people, many of them refugees, gathered in a parliamentary committee room to mark the end of the pilot phase of lofC UK's course, Refugees as Re-Builders™. The course is for settled refugees who wish to contribute to the recovery of their countries of origin as well as to their host country. Two refugees, Dr Teame Mebrahtu, an Eritrean educationalist at Bristol University, and Dr Nagi Barakat, former Libyan Minister of Health, received awards for their outstanding contributions to the recovery of their countries of origin.



Indonesia

Generasi Cerdas Indonesia (GCI) collaborated with lofC Indonesia to run three teachers' camps in 2018. The camps focused on reflective teaching, a process of self-observation and self-evaluation. Muhamad Ramadhona, founder of GCI, remarked, 'We hope that each of us will feel inspired to learn through this time together, particularly for the success of your schools.'

Chad

The launch of Chad – a journey to hope took place in N'Djaména in March 2019, co-hosted by the Chadian Association of Initiatives of Change and Chad's National Network for Peace and Reconciliation (CSAPR). The documentary depicts a bid to forge a national network of Chadian mediators, transcending the ethnic, religious and political divisions that have beleaquered the country since its inception. Former enemies and renowned peacemakers from Nigeria, Imam Dr Muhammad Ashafa and Pastor Dr James Wuye, were invited to Chad by the UN and CSAPR to lead the process. The film was made by IofC's For the Love of Tomorrow Films, with funding from the United Nations Development Programme and the European Union.

India

lofC India's 'Governance and Grampari Adopted Village' programme covers five villages over three years. Among the results are a new awareness about forest fires: Grampari has supplied villagers with water pumps which can be carried on their backs to put out fires. Another project includes reed bed filtration systems to filter grey water, which can be used for agriculture and other purposes. This has had a great impact on village women, who are starting to take an active part in village development work.

Netherlands

In The Hague, Hindus, Christians and Muslims are gathering around their common belief in protecting the earth and taking joint action to make their faith communities more sustainable. This is made possible through the Geloven in Groen (faith in green) initiative. Representatives of more than 26 houses of worship are taking part in the gatherings.

ARMAGH Melbourne, Australia

'Armagh', the Australia-Pacific Centre for Initiatives of Change in Melbourne, was a generous gift to the work of Initiatives of Change in 1956 from the Cecil Mackay family. Over the years since then, this gracious 100-year-old home has been used for lofC conferences, events and training courses, notably the Life Matters workshops which draw participants from all over the Asia Pacific region. Indigenous Australians often contribute their culture, spirituality and stories to programmes at Armagh, which is situated on the land of the Wurundjeri nation.

ASIA PLATEAU Panchgani, India

Nestling in the western hills of India and overlooking the Krishna Valley sits Asia Plateau, a centre for introspection and dialogue. Created in 1967, it runs training courses in character development throughout the year for people in industry, the armed forces and NGOs, as well as for school and university students and for families.

In the past four decades men and women of all classes, races and religions have experienced a change in motivation and behaviour at Asia Plateau, which has caused ripples in their personal lives, families, workplaces, communities and beyond. Thousands of people from all walks of life took part in programmes at Asia Plateau in 2018.

Asia Plateau's rural development and environmental centre, Grampari, is located on the 68-acre Asia Plateau campus. Grampari teaches communities to protect their water sources, reduce and manage waste, and to farm sustainably.

CAUX PALACECaux, Switzerland

In 1946, around 100 Swiss individuals and families, led by the Geneva-born diplomat Phillipe Mottu, bought the Caux Palace. The former hotel was given new life as an international conference centre for Initiatives of Change. Immediately after World War II, hundreds of meetings between French and German delegations took place there, creating a solid ground for further reconciliation efforts in Europe. Over the years, Caux has become a reference point for reconciliation and trustbuilding efforts.

Continuing that tradition, every summer over 1,500 people from all over the world come to the Caux Forum to explore their role in bringing change in the world. This annual programme of conferences, training and dialogues aims to inspire, equip and connect individuals, groups and organizations to build a just, peaceful and sustainable world. It offers a safe space of trust, care, solidarity and respect, in which participants can interact openly and in-depth.

Trustbuilding Signature Programme

In 2019 IofC International is launching a new international trustbuilding programme in partnership with the Fetzer Institute, a respected US not-for-profit foundation. The programme will be piloted in Kenya, Canada, and a third country to be determined.

Council of Europe (CoE)

Since 2005, Initiatives of Change has held participatory status at the Council of Europe (CoE), which has 47 member states. IofC is a member of one of its three advisory bodies, the Conference of International NGOs.

lofC delegates have been entrusted with a variety of special assignments, concerning human rights and business, and the digital society and cyber trust. lofC is represented on the Executive Committee of the North-South Centre, which organizes programmes and exchanges with Europe's neighbours to the south.





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
